GETS Upper Intermediate is a modular English language test designed specifically to assess the English language skills of high-school students who are preparing for school leaving examinations. It tests their ability in four language skills, Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking. Candidates can choose to sit all four modules together or as separate tests in any possible combination. It is distributed through a network of Authorised Test Centres that run and administer the test. Results are easy to interpret and are aligned to the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR), the international standard for describing language ability.

GETS Upper Intermediate is part of the **GETS for School suite** of exams all of which are designed to measure students' level of English that is required to be able to do well in all subjects of study in an English medium school. Learners, particularly non-native English users in English medium schools, are challenged by the language used in the teaching and learning of curricular subjects and may even find it abstract or incomprehensible. Research shows that low English language proficiency is reflected in lower performance in all subjects of academic study in English medium schools.

The **GETS for School suite** motivates students to be equipped with a wide range of vocabulary, grammatical structures, and language skills needed for the deep learning of school subjects. The tests help in enhancing a student's communicative competence for academic life as well as for meeting day-to-day needs.

GETS Primary, GETS Secondary and GETS Intermediate are designed for students of grades

4 to 9, who are in the formative stages of language learning. These three are based on the concept of Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL) and encourage both Basic Interpersonal Communication Skills as well as Academic Language Proficiency. At the next level, **GETS Upper Intermediate** is visualised as being suitable for the transitional stage of language learning for students of grades 10-12.

English is the language of scientific and technological research, the language of the internet and of media, and it makes it easy to travel and study all over the world, as also to access multiple cultures. Therefore, students at high school need to be confident users of English at the point when their independent interactions with the world inside and outside the school are increasing.


